Geochemical controls on the intensity and maturity of development of supergene enrichment profiles

ABSTRACT—Examples of supergene-related metals accumulations from sulfide and some non-sulfide protoliths indicate that a consistent series of parameters – geochemical and mechanical – are responsible for the maturity of supergene metals enrichment. The formation of a mature geochemical stratigraphy or regionally extensive metals mobility and accumulation may or may not produce economically attractive metals enhancement, despite local to regional availability of rock components during favorable weathering periods; this is because the geochemical and physical factors that determine supergene profile development must have acted within a restricted environment that ultimately permitted preservation of metals from post-enrichment redistribution.

AGS Spring Field Trip Saturday, 18 April 2009 — 10 am–2 pm Tucson Mountain Chaos—Revisited

The Tucson Mountain Chaos was the second formation in the world to be given the formal name "chaos," by John Kinnison in 1958, and it remains controversial to this day. The formation is a megabreccia intermittently exposed along much of the length of the Tucson Mtns. It has been variously interpreted as a thrust breccia, landslide deposits, basal ignimbrite facies, and direct evidence of volcanic fluidization. Doug Shakel, AGS VP for Field Trips, will lead the trip.

Participants will visit two roadside armwaving locations, through the exotic blocks of Chaos! limestone, andesites, schist, and weird green stuff! Have you ever seen an anticline **within** a dacite dike?

The trip will be a 2-hour casual walk, about 1 mile round trip, mostly in a sandy wash but with some rock scrambles. The maximum elevation change will be +/-20 feet. Wear hiking boots or high-top tennies; shorts are not a good idea if your legs don't like scratchy bushes. (Snakes are a possibility, weather permitting.)

Participants will meet and leave from the parking lot of Feliz Paseos County Park, 1600 N. Camino de Oeste (about 1/3 mile north of W. Speedway Blvd.). We will travel in AGSprovided vans to control parking. There will be a \$12 per person charge for the trip. Bring a picnic lunch; AGS will provide water and soft drinks. The trip is suitable for well-behaved and interested youngsters age 13 and up.
